Food trucks


Fabulous food trucks Wafflerita and Just a Buck Truck will add to the fun.

Garage Sale Success

On August 27 & 28, nearly 150 homes participated in the Cherry Knolls, The Knolls, and Tiffany Joint Neighborhood Garage Sale. Enjoying its twelfth year, the event was sponsored by The Steller Group, composed of Realtors and Cherry Knolls neighbors Conrad and Jennifer Steller, Emily Lonborg, Bill Dehmlow, Seth Jones, and Beth Walden.

Sellers who took part in the event needed only to focus solely on setting up their merchandise and manning their sales; all the work of promoting the event was provided courtesy of The Steller Group. Buyers were brought right to sellers' driveways via newspaper advertising, online and social media postings, banners, directional signage, and printed maps designating which homes were hosting a sale. When surveyed, 75% of the sellers stated that the community garage sale was "much more successful" than what they could have done on their own.

Cherry Knolls resident Rolf Asphaug provided the following insights: "Having a neighborhood sale brought in a lot of potential buyers, and made the buyers happier as well because they had many sales to visit."



Russell Gulch in its heyday

I was recently looking at an online topographical map of our neighborhood when I saw an interesting notation just south of Cherry Knolls, in the Knolls subdivision: "Big Dry Creek Placers." (See picture.) The notation was just north of Big Dry Creek itself, which starts in Highlands Ranch, runs through the South Suburban Golf Course and Cherry Knolls Park, is intersected by the High Line Canal, and empties into the Platte River north of downtown Littleton.

None of the other maps I'd seen of our neighborhood contained this mysterious reference to "Big Dry Creek Placers." I Googled the name and found out that our area was once home to one of Colorado's original gold mines, pre-dating the "Pikes Peak or Bust" gold rush of 1859.

A placer mine is a surface mine where rivers and streams are sifted for gold deposits – by individual miners panning for gold, or with more extensive machinery such as sluice boxes and rockers all the way up to the huge barges that used to ply rivers near Breckenridge. The other type of mining – lode mining – involves tunneling into the earth to dig up deposits.

In 1848 a group of Cherokee Indians were taking horses on the Cherokee Trail from Oklahoma to California, but they were too late in the season to cross the Rockies. They wintered at the confluence of the Platte River and Cherry Creek – what is now in downtown Denver – and found a little gold there. When they returned to Oklahoma they told other tribe members what they'd found, but the information remained unused until nearly a decade later, when a Georgia gold miner named William Greenberry Russell – who

was married to a Cherokee woman – learned of the find and decided to organize a mining party.

In 1858 Russell, his two brothers, a fellow miner named Sam Bates and several dozen other white and Cherokee prospectors traveled from Oklahoma along the Santa Fe Trail to what is now Confluence Park in Denver. They began prospecting there, but with limited success most of the miners returned home. The Russell brothers, Bates, and nine other men stayed, and started to explore farther south into what's now our neighborhood. In July 1858 they reported "good diggings" at the mouth of Big Dry Creek on the South Platte, and they continued to set up placer operations upstream along Big Dry Creek from there, including at what's now Cherry Knolls and the Knolls. The "Big Dry Creek Placer Mine" in our neighborhood was actually owned by William Greenberry Russell and Sam Bates.

The Russell-Bates reports of gold caused a huge sensation back East: the Colorado Gold Rush of 1859, in which tens of thousands of miners and settlers pulled up roots and headed

to Colorado. By 1860 the center of mining activity had shifted from placer mines on the Platte River and Big Dry Creek to lode mines in Idaho Springs and especially Central City: a remote outpost which suddenly exploded into a city of 60,000 inhabitants.

Not much is known of Sam Bates, but William Greenberry (a.k.a. Green) Russell (see picture) left a still-visible mark on Colorado. The town of Russell Gulch, near Central City, is now a ghost town but still has a few buildings standing.



However, the tenure of Russell and other Georgia miners in Colorado was short, because the Civil War caused these southerners to be ostracized, or worse. Russell was able to secure safe passage to Georgia by promising not to take up arms against the Union; he technically kept that promise, but he served in a non-combatant role with the Confederate Army.

Is it worth it to get a pan and try to find gold in Big Dry Creek today? Sadly, no: what little records exist indicate that the Big Dry Creek Placer Mine never yielded worthwhile quantities of the precious metal. But it's fascinating to think that our neighborhood was once at the very epicenter of the great Colorado Gold Rush of 1859, which for better and worse transformed our state, our nation, and our continent.
